**Reason for Referral:**

William Herbert Woolley, III, is a married, 60-year-old, Caucasian man who was referred for forensic evaluation to address his psychological and psychosexual functioning. Mr. Woolley is charged in Wagoner County Case Number CF-2018-167 with two counts of Sexual Abuse – Child under 12. He is also charged in Wagoner County Case Number CF-2018-553 with the offenses of Murder in the First Degree – Child Abuse and Sexual Abuse – Child under 12. On March 30, 2018, Mr. Woolley's grandson, Elijah, who was 14 months old was found deceased in his crib by Mr. Woolley's spouse, Lisa Kay Woolley. Mr. Woolley and his spouse were guardians to their grandchildren, Elijah and Clayton (age 6). The grandparents had assumed guardianship from their eldest daughter, Desiree, who had two sons with different fathers and experienced patterns of instability, neglect, domestic violence, and substance abuse that led to guardianship.

Shortly after Elijah's death, forensic interviewing of Clayton, who was then five years old, occurred. Clayton underwent two recorded forensic interviews that did not yield disclosures surrounding abuse. Between the two forensic child abuse interviews, Clayton underwent a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) examination by Meagan Sinclair, RN, on March 31, 2018. In the unrecorded SANE interview, Clayton reportedly disclosed that "papa" (a.k.a., Mr. Woolley) had been placing his penis inside of Elijah's "butt" on a frequency of "every day." Clayton reported that Elijah would cry and get a "spanking" when it happened. Clayton also stated that Mr. Woolley engaged in a similar act with him in the shower. Clayton reported that the events happened daily in the living room on the couch. Clayton stated that the grandmother, Lisa Woolley, was present and watched.

The report by the Medical Examiner, Cheryl Niblo, D.O., determined that injuries to Elijah's body and anus were the result of acute injuries that occurred at the time of death. Dr. Niblo described patterns of anal sodomy and asphyxiation that led to the death of Elijah. A subsequent forensic pathologist, Carl J. Schmidt, M.D., issued a report dated May 25, 2019 disputing the nature of the injuries, underlying pathology, and cause of death.

At the onset of the evaluation, Mr. Woolley was advised of the nature and purpose of the assessment. He was instructed about the potential distribution and use of the results. He was aware of the limitations of confidentiality due to the legal context in which the assessment occurred. His spouse, Lisa Woolley, was interviewed. Each individual understood this information. Mr. Woolley agreed to participate and provided informed consent.

**Procedures of Evaluation:**

Mr. Woolley was evaluated on May 2, 2019 and May 29, 2019. The first evaluative session was for seven hours and included interviewing, testing, mental status assessment, and behavioral observations. The second evaluation occurred on May 29, 2019 for approximately 40 minutes of interviewing. His wife, Lisa Woolley, underwent a collateral interview on May 29, 2019 for approximately one hour.

Psychological testing was completed. The Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory-2 (MMPI-2), Multiphasic Sex Inventory-II (MSI-II), Beck Depression Inventory-2 (BDI-2), Beck Anxiety Inventory (BAI), Symptom Checklist-90-Revised (SCL-90-R), Substance Abuse Subtle Screening Inventory-4 (SASSI-4), Hare Psychopathy Checklist-Revised: Second Edition (Hare PCL-R: 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition), and the Static-99R were used during the course of the evaluative process.

Extensive records were reviewed, along with audiotaped and videotaped information associated with the investigation and apprehension of Mr. Woolley, including:

- Discovery information consisting of 641 Bates stamped pages associated with the investigation and arrest of Mr. and Mrs. Woolley;
- Transcript of Preliminary Hearing held on July 31, 2018 in Wagoner County Case Numbers CF-2018-167 and CF-2018-168, including the submitted Exhibits;
- Electronic search information and data associated with the seizure of two iPhones and a Samsung cellular phone;
- Crime scene photographs;
- Photographs associated with the execution of a Search Warrant;
- Report by Carl J. Schmidt, M.D., Forensic Pathologist, dated May 25, 2019;
- Review of OSCN and ODCR for Mr. Woolley;
- Audio of the 911 Call to the Broken Arrow Police Department;
- Viewing of the Mighty Mart Cameras;
- Review of two recorded interviews of William H. Woolley, III;
- Review of the videotaped transportation of Mr. Woolley to the Wagoner County Sheriff's Office for interrogation;
- Review of two recorded interviews of Glory Woolley;
- Review of recorded interview of Lisa Woolley;

- Review of recorded interview of Gabriel Woolley;
- Review of audiotaped interview of Desiree Woolley;

**Relevant History:**

William Herbert Woolley, III, was born on March 3, 1959 in Japan to the union of William Herbert Woolley, Jr., and Maria Isabel Woolley. His father had a history of military service and was last employed at NORAD as a computer analyst in the Air Force. He died while Mr. Woolley was jailed for the present case. His mother is 84 years old and has functioned as a housewife and homemaker.

Surrounding early development, Mr. Woolley denied problems in his prenatal development, birth, and attainment of developmental milestones. Concerning medical history, he underwent an appendectomy at the age of 16. He reported having surgery on his left knee at the age of 16 consequent to a football injury. At the age of 19, he reported undergoing surgery on his left pinky finger after acquiring an injury associated with a cut. Mr. Woolley reported having injured his right knee in a skiing accident. He disclosed having ongoing knee pain. He reported the removal of basal cell carcinoma on his face at the age of 45. He denied a history of experiencing head injury. At the time of assessment, Mr. Woolley was not receiving medication. He has never been prescribed medication for emotional or behavioral reasons across his lifespan.

Concerning his family of origin, Mr. Woolley explained that his parents divorced when he was approximately 30 years old. He reported that his father had been a "functioning alcoholic at times," although periods of sobriety occurred. His mother remarried following divorce and remains married to Rick Montgomery. His father was married to Rita Woolley at the time of his death. He has two sisters who are 64 and 62 years old. His eldest sister, Rose Mary Crouser, is a retired teacher. His youngest sister, Marilyn Hochstetler, is employed in real estate.

Across his childhood and adolescence, Mr. Woolley indicated that he was never exposed to domestic violence nor did he experience emotional, physical, or sexual abuse. At times, he reported that his father would abuse alcohol and be critical, although he denied patterns associated with abuse or neglect. His daughter, Desiree Woolley (age 25), has a history of

substance abuse but attained abstinence through long term treatment. Other family members do not have patterns associated with substance abuse. Mental illness was denied in the family history.

Mr. Woolley graduated in 1977 from Doherty High School in Colorado Springs, Colorado. While in high school, he reported having been member of the National Honor Society. He was never involved in special education or retained. He denied a history of suspension or expulsion. Behavioral problems did not occur. He reported active involvement in sports such as football, wrestling, and soccer.

After high school graduation, Mr. Woolley attended Colorado State University. He recalled that his grades deteriorated to a 1.98 grade point average. He explained that he did not know his future career goal and became socially involved with alcohol and marijuana use. He attended college for two years before withdrawing in 1979 due to his grandmother's illness. Mr. Woolley reported traveling to Florida to assist his grandfather due to his grandmother's illness with cancer. He began residential painting with a cousin for income.

In 1987, Mr. Woolley reported having a religious experience in which he became "saved." Mr. Woolley explained that his religious devotion led to his cessation of marijuana and reduction of alcohol. He married his present wife, Lisa Kay Woolley, in 1989. He returned to Colorado State University in 1990, graduating with a degree in business administration and marketing in 1992 with a 3.7 grade point average. Concerning other education, Mr. Woolley acquired his insurance license in 2003 and his real estate license in 2017.

At the time of the present evaluation, Mr. Woolley was unemployed. He explained that after his second release from jail, he had worked as a valet through a contract provider, Royal Valet. He was working at the River Spirit Casino. He explained that a coworker complained of his charges, which resulted in Mr. Woolley losing employment.

Before his arrest, a pattern of stable employment was demonstrated. At the time of his arrest in April of 2018, Mr. Woolley was employed on a part-time basis as a customer service agent for Delta Airlines at the Tulsa International Airport. He reported having worked for Delta Airlines for 12 years. He explained that he also had employment as a real estate agent through Keller Williams Realty. Although he remains licensed, he is unable to function in the capacity of a real estate agent due to the current charges. Mr. Woolley explained that he and his wife have also bred dogs for 12 years. His friend who operates Royal Valet has periodically employed Mr. Woolley for several years to work at events. Mr. Woolley denied a history of receiving income related to disability or Worker's Compensation.

Interpersonally, Mr. Woolley is married to Lisa Kay Woolley (age 57). Patterns of domestic violence and marital separation were denied. Each individual described being in a stable

marriage without significant conflict. The couple produced three children, Desiree Woolley (age 25), Gabriel Woolley (age 24), and Glory Woolley (age 19).<sup>1</sup> Mr. Woolley's son, Gabriel, attends Northeastern State University and works at Union Elementary School. His daughter, Glory, is a sophomore at Oklahoma State University majoring in international business with a minor in Spanish. His daughter, Desiree, graduated from Freedom House, which is part of Teen Challenge, due to long-standing patterns of substance abuse that originated during high school.

Mr. Woolley and his wife were raising Desiree's two children, Clayton (age 6) and Elijah (age 14 months) at the time of Elijah's death. The grandparents became guardians due to Desiree's ongoing patterns of drug abuse, neglectful conditions for the children, and exposure of her children to domestic violence. Mr. Woolley explained that Desiree is the only child who has engaged in patterns of substance abuse and errant behavior. He recalled the origin of her substance abuse as beginning at the age of 15 when Desiree had a broken tooth and was prescribed opioid medication. Desiree has established abstinence for approximately two years.

Mr. Woolley reported providing care to his grandchildren outside of his work schedule. Concerning Elijah, Mr. Woolley explained that while he and his wife provided primary care, Elijah received care during their church attendance through the nursery. He noted that Elijah attended Playtime Plus and had private babysitters when he and his wife were not available to watch Elijah. Upon questioning, he described that attempts were not made to conceal Elijah from others.<sup>2</sup> For example, he acknowledged that diaper changes had been performed by individuals who cared for Elijah during these situations outside of the home. His daughter, Glory, reported to investigators that she often helped care for Elijah, including her performance of diaper changes.

Concerning mental health, Mr. Woolley does not have a history of intervention or treatment. He denied ever having participated in counseling, therapy, or being recommended or encouraged to attend counseling or any type of mental health treatment. He has never been prescribed psychotropic medication. He has never been involved in substance abuse treatment, nor encouraged or recommended to attend substance abuse services. He disclosed the onset of alcohol use at the age of 16, which consisted of social use in high school and college. He reported the onset of marijuana use at the age of 18. He admitted progressing to daily marijuana use between the ages of 22 to 25 years old until he

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<sup>1</sup> Concerning the children of Mr. Woolley, there is no investigative information derived that would corroborate or establish their experience of physical, emotional, or sexual abuse. There are no indications that domestic violence has occurred in Mr. Woolley's marital relationship.

<sup>2</sup> Sadistic sexual abuse occurring on a routine basis would lead to opportunities of discovery through babysitting or being watched by others such as in daycare or nurseries.

became "born again."<sup>3</sup> Since that time, Mr. Woolley denied the use of marijuana. He reported that he will occasionally drink alcohol "maybe three times a month." Due to his father's history of alcoholism, Mr. Woolley explained that will not consume more than two to three alcoholic drinks at one time.

Legally, Mr. Woolley does not have a history of involvement with the adult criminal justice system apart from the current proceedings. He does not have a history of interaction with the juvenile justice system. Mr. Woolley denied involvement with child welfare agencies across his childhood and adolescence. Concerning his children, he denied involvement with child welfare agencies associated with investigations or referrals. He explained that his only involvement before the current proceedings was his obtaining of guardianship of his grandchildren, Elijah and Clayton. Upon inquiry, Mr. Woolley acknowledged that he had passed background investigations due to his employment with Delta Airlines at the Tulsa International Airport. Mr. Woolley reported, consistent with information on ODCR, the presence of distant financial problems associated with his involvement in real estate during the recession that led to bankruptcy.

Concerning case-related events, the surviving grandson, Clayton, was five years old when he underwent two recorded forensic interviews and an unrecorded SANE evaluation by Meagan Sinclair, RN. The first interview of Clayton occurred on March 31, 2018, followed by the SANE evaluation during the evening of the same date. The second forensic interview of Clayton occurred on April 4, 2018. No disclosures of abuse occurred during the forensic interviews.

For the SANE evaluation, records indicate that Clayton was interviewed the evening of March 31, 2018. Ms. Sinclair indicated that the two hour interview ended about 9:00 at night. Mr. Woolley reported, and his spouse confirmed, that Clayton would have typically been asleep at that time. Clayton usually began his bedtime routine around 7:00 in the evening which was the start of the SANE interview. Of significance, Ms. Sinclair indicated that Clayton named Mr. Woolley to be "papa" as evidenced by the statement, "He [Clayton] said William." Mr. Woolley and his spouse indicated that family members and others do not refer to him as William, but as Bill, which is how Clayton should have potentially referenced his grandfather. Clayton referenced the sexual abuse as occurring daily in a common area of the residence, visible to his grandmother, which would expose the abuse to others such as their daughter, Glory, who was living in the residence. In addition to daily anal sodomy of Elijah, daily spankings were reported. Despite such traumatic events that Clayton witnessed and even personally experienced on one occasion in the shower, the SANE nurse indicated that there was no need for any type of referral for psychological intervention. While the SANE nurse indicated the diagnosis of "fear," information from the

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<sup>3</sup> Since becoming "saved" in 1987 to the present day, Mr. Woolley indicated that his daily routine involves awakening early in the morning for one hour of prayer and Bible study. Family members confirm such activity.

records does not indicate such emotion. Clayton was documented to have been smiling. Of even more significance, the SANE nurse testified, "I didn't notice a speech impediment." Her observation fails to account for Clayton's educational history and ongoing diagnoses associated with speech and language impairment.

Limitations in forensic interviewing during the SANE examination are indicated. The nurse indicated that she did not make any type of judgments concerning the reliability of Clayton's statements, but reported "believing" his disclosure. She acknowledged an absence of attempting to inquire about Clayton's capacity to tell the difference between truth versus a lie. The nurse acknowledged that she did not advise Clayton about truthfulness. These are standard components of a forensic child abuse interview. While Clayton made a disclosure concerning the appearance of Mr. Woolley's penis, inquiries about the state of his penis being erect or flaccid were not made. There were no inquiries made by the nurse concerning the presence of clothing or undergarments such as underwear or diapers or whether contact occurred outside or underneath clothing. Despite disclosures made by Clayton to the SANE nurse, the recorded forensic interviews performed before and after the SANE examination did not yield disclosures.

Evidence from the investigation clearly indicates that Clayton has significant impairment in his speech, language, and communication skills. Clayton's speech pathologist, Elaine Welte, from Highland Park Elementary School provided information to investigators. She noted that Clayton had an Individualized Educational Program (IEP) for speech and language skills that were below his developmental level. Ms. Welte described Clayton to be "sweet" and "energetic" without significant behavioral or emotional problems. The behavioral observations were made despite Clayton's disclosure of having witnessed daily anal sodomy of Elijah as well as having encountered at least one incident of personal sexual abuse. Other school officials such as his counselor and principal did not indicate any signs of aggression for Clayton. Records from the Department of Human Services indicate that in 2016, Clayton was identified to have a Phonological Disorder (i.e., speech sound or articulation disorder) and Mixed Receptive-Expressive Language Disorder<sup>4</sup> that were documented to persist until at least 2018. Given documentation that reveals speech as well as receptive and expressive language deficits, forensic protocols should be carefully followed in the interviewing of Clayton.

Despite the SANE examiner having failed to recognize speech and language deficits, the Department of Human Services investigator, Shane Greer, documented observing speech-related issues during the course of the investigation. Mr. Greer readily observed articulation problems. Receptive and expressive problems are also indicated. For example,

Mr. Greer reported that Clayton disclosed that he gets spanked "100,000 times"<sup>5</sup> with an object that sounded like a "trainer" due to his articulation problem. Mr. Greer concluded that the object Clayton reported being spanked with was a "trainer" due to the family involvement breeding dogs. Mr. Greer also noted that Clayton stated that he was "spanked today," yet communicated he felt safe.

Discipline patterns were identified during the course of the investigation. Mr. Woolley's daughter, Glory Woolley, indicated that parental discipline involved her being grounded or "talked to." On some occasions, she advised we would "pray about it." On other occasions, Glory reported that discipline involved losing cell phone privileges. When she was a child, Glory acknowledged that she would be spanked. Glory explained that Elijah was "too young" to spank and that Clayton was not usually spanked. She noted that her father does not lose his temper, nor does he often raise his voice.

An investigative interview with Elijah's mother, Desiree Woolley, occurred. Desiree disclosed beginning to abuse substances during adolescence. She reported withdrawing from her family and church because she was developing substance abuse. Concerning the birth of her children, Desiree acknowledged abusing substances during each pregnancy. When pregnant with Clayton at the age of 17, Desiree reported that she used marijuana and tobacco. She reported that Clayton was born six weeks premature. She stated that Clayton had "traces of something" in his umbilical cord, although child welfare did not attempt to remove him from her custody. Desiree explained that after Clayton was born, she continued to abuse substances, resulting in the Clayton's placement in a guardianship. Concerning her pregnancy with Elijah, Desiree disclosed that she had been "doing meth all the time" and even made the statement that her drug use involved "all day." She explained that her relationship with Elijah's father was "based on drugs." She reported a lack of prenatal care during her pregnancy with Elijah. She explained that she "did so much meth" during her pregnancy with Elijah, but believed she carried him full-term.

Desiree described Elijah to appear malnourished, tiny, and wrinkly upon delivery. She reported that Elijah was born at home and delivered by Mr. Woolley. Desiree stated that the delivery at home was due to the fast progression of labor. Mr. Woolley indicated that his daughter began having contractions, and delivery occurred as the family was preparing to leave for the hospital. Mr. Woolley reported having previously delivered his youngest daughter at home with a midwife.

During the first month in which Desiree cared for Elijah after his birth, Desiree explained that she was living in a home where drugs were kept and used. Desiree stated that she experienced domestic violence, characterized as involving physical abuse, during the

pregnancy and Elijah's first year of life. Her parents subsequently obtained guardianship of Elijah. Concerning Elijah's development, Desiree indicated that Elijah was difficult to soothe, chronically constipated, and was slow in his establishment of developmental milestones. She informed investigators that Elijah had progressed differently from Clayton, verbalizing, "It's because of my choices."

**Mental Status:**

Mr. Woolley presented as an appropriately dressed and groomed Caucasian male at the time of each evaluative session. He was cooperative and open in his disclosures throughout the evaluative process. His responses are deemed reliable as evidenced by verification of his statements through collateral information reviewed. He demonstrated appropriate social skills, appeared reflective and insightful about parenting, and appropriately followed social protocol. Mr. Woolley exhibited adequate attention and concentration. Abnormalities in his psychomotor activity were not displayed. His speech remained of normal rate and rhythm.

Mr. Woolley's mood was euthymic. He expressed sadness and apprehension during interviewing surrounding the loss of Elijah as well as separation from Clayton and family members due to court restrictions. Lability of affect was not displayed. His affective expressions were neither increased nor decreased in range or intensity and remained congruent with respect to his expressed thought content. He demonstrated good emotional regulation.<sup>6</sup> He cited his faith, family, and friends as his source of emotional and personal support.

Cognitively, Mr. Woolley was appropriately oriented. Memory impairment was not displayed. His expressed thoughts remained coherent, logical, and goal-directed. Psychotic symptoms were not endorsed or displayed. He denied thoughts of wanting to harm himself or others. Mr. Woolley denied a history of engaging in self-injurious behavior as well as suicide attempts.

**Test Results:**

The Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory-2 (MMPI-2) was completed for the assessment of Mr. Woolley's personality functioning and symptoms. He produced a profile that is interpretable and valid. However, Mr. Woolley was self-protective in his approach to testing which appears associated with the context of the criminal proceeding. He portrays himself as being well-adjusted and responsible. He denies psychological problems and does not endorse items that would be reflective of emotional distress or discomfort. Mr.

When Mr. Woolley did not display emotions, his appearance was opined to be odd or unemotional. When he displayed emotions, conclusions were made that his grief was not genuine or staged.

Woolley's pattern is reflective of an individual with personal virtue which appears related to his spirituality. His clinical profile is within normal limits. He views himself as dealing effectively with his life situation. Nonetheless, Mr. Woolley acknowledged some periods of low mood, health-related concerns, and pessimism about the future. These feelings appear to be normal for his age and situation and are not symptomatic of a psychological disorder. Mr. Woolley's responses suggest that he is rather noncompetitive and passive, generally easy-going, and uncritical in interpersonal situations. His response content reflects a high degree of self-confidence and the ability to deal with life. He is quite outgoing and sociable with a strong need to be around others. Overall, his profile is within normal limits and a clinical diagnosis is not indicated.

The Multiphasic Sex Inventory-II (MSI-II) was completed for the assessment of Mr. Woolley's psychosexual functioning. On testing, he acknowledged having been accused of sexual offenses against children as well as having been accused of homicide. Overall, Mr. Woolley scored in acceptable ranges for consistency in responses and validity, although defensiveness appears indicated about his own interest in sex. Most persons alleged to have committed serious sex-related offenses show a measure of defensiveness. On testing, Mr. Woolley does not report having been physically or sexually abused. Concerning sexual deviance, Mr. Woolley does not report committing a sex offense. He acknowledged having been accused of sexual offenses, although he does not report having engaged in such behavior. He does not report having used thoughts or fantasies involving children for sexual arousal, nor does he report ever having attempted to engage a child in sex activity. Mr. Woolley does not report having engaged in molest behavior. He does not report having killed another during a sexual encounter. Overall, Mr. Woolley tends to have a moralistic view of some sexual behaviors that are viewed as acceptable or normal by others. Concerning interviewing of sexual beliefs, Mr. Woolley cited his spirituality and religiosity. He referenced that many behaviors on this measure were considered by him to be immoral. Mr. Woolley explained that he considers sexual behavior to only occur within a monogamous marital relationship. He believes pornography or other activities that lead to sexual thoughts outside of a marital bond to be morally wrong. Mr. Woolley does not have a history of delinquent or conduct problems as a youth or an adult. There is no indication that he suffers from any form of sexual dysfunction and/or desire disorder. He appears satisfied with his physical features and general appearance. He denies being preoccupied with sex.

The Symptom Checklist-90-Revised (SCL-90-R), Beck Depression Inventory-2 (BDI-2), and the Beck Anxiety Inventory (BAI) were administered for the assessment of present symptomatology. Consistent with other test-based data, as well as information obtained through collateral procedures, Mr. Woolley does not demonstrate evidence of symptoms of mental illness. He does not demonstrate concerns associated with depression, anxiety, or anger. There is no evidence of paranoid ideation or psychotic symptoms.

The Substance Abuse Subtle Screening Inventory-4 (SASSI-4) was completed for the assessment of Mr. Woolley's likelihood of having a substance-related disorder. He completed this procedure without evidence of random responding or defensiveness. Mr. Woolley attained the result of having a low probability of a substance use disorder.

The Hare Psychopathy Checklist-Revised: Second Edition (Hare PCL-R: 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition) was administered for the assessment of the presence of psychopathy. Psychopathy is characteristic of extreme forms of a personality disorder that is associated with aggression, recidivism, and other antisocial acts. Psychopathy has been identified to be associated with sadistic sexual behavior and aligned with behavioral problems marked by an absence of empathy, irresponsibility, deceitfulness, manipulativeness, poor behavioral controls, and promiscuous sexual behavior. Mr. Woolley obtained a Hare PCL-R: 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition total score of 1. This total score is extremely low and well below the suggested cutoff used for the identification of psychopathy. Features of psychopathy as well as any type of personality disorder are not indicated. Mr. Woolley does not demonstrate features of psychopathy.

The Static-99R was used as a framework for viewing risk for sexual offending, along with the research associated with sadistic sexual offenses. Mr. Woolley's current age of 60 years old places him at the lowest risk category based on age associated with sexual offending. Mr. Woolley has been in a stable marital relationship for approximately three decades (i.e., 29 years). There are no previous allegations of nonsexual violence or violent offenses. There is no history of previous sexual offenses or allegations. Mr. Woolley has never been sentenced in regard to a juvenile or adult criminal proceeding. There is no history of conviction for a noncontact or contact sexual offense. There is no evidence of any unrelated or stranger victims. A positive factor is identified for his allegation of having male victims. Overall, Mr. Woolley is placed at the lowest risk category (Risk Level I). In comparison to a routine sample with the same score over a five year span for recidivism, a 1.3% risk rate is indicated.

Research identifies characteristics of individuals who have committed sadistic sexual offenses involving homicide. Homicidal child molesters have more frequently victimized strangers, have high levels of psychopathology, demonstrate sexual sadism, often have three or more psychiatric diagnoses, and have a history of violent nonsexual and sexual offenses.<sup>7</sup> Such offenders often have high degrees of psychopathy with a majority having female stranger victims.<sup>8</sup> Other characteristics of sadistic sexual killers reflect that such offenders have an earlier onset of delinquency, attended reform school, were members of

criminal gangs, displayed sexual deviancy, collected pornography, abused substances, and engaged in fire setting and animal cruelty.<sup>9</sup> Such offenders often have disruptive childhoods, a history of violence, sexual deviancy, and substance abuse.<sup>10</sup> Similarly, high prevalence rates for past and current substance abuse, psychiatric problems, sexual disorders, poor sexual functioning, and personality disorders have been associated with offenders who sexually abuse and kill young children.<sup>11 12</sup>

### **Diagnosis and Summary:**

William Herbert Woolley, III, is a married, 60-year-old, Caucasian man who is presently charged with two counts of Sexual Abuse – Child under 12 in Wagoner County Case Number CF-2018-167. In addition, he is charged in Wagoner County Case Number CF-2018-553 with the offenses of Murder in the First Degree – Child Abuse and Sexual Abuse – Child under 12. The allegations are associated with the alleged sadistic sexual sodomization and homicide of his 14-month-old grandson, Elijah, and conduct toward his then five-year-old grandson, Clayton.

Mr. Woolley does not meet criteria for the establishment of a current mental health diagnosis. Results of the present forensic evaluation do not establish the presence of an identifiable mental health disorder. There is no evidence that Mr. Woolley is experiencing a psychiatric disorder associated with mental illness or a personality disorder. There is no evidence of ongoing or current patterns of substance abuse or dependence. There is no evidence of a sexual disorder detected through testing or his history. Of significance, an absence of psychopathy is detected. Psychopathy is characterized by severe and pathological personality functioning associated with antisocial behavior and narcissism. While a psychological assessment cannot determine whether an individual has engaged in a specific behavior, Mr. Woolley does not present with features identified through research associated with individuals who have committed sadistic sexual homicides.

Collateral information obtained by law enforcement during the course of the investigation about Mr. Woolley's functioning yields consistent historical details about his functioning.



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Mr. Woolley is characterized to be very religious, principled in his behavior, and patterned in his routine that includes daily prayer. Seizure of electronic media did not identify the presence of pornographic material. He does not have a felony record or identified history of aggression. There is no evidence of domestic violence in his family relationships. Mr. Woolley and his spouse successfully acquired guardianship of each grandchild based upon their observations of their daughter's substance abuse, neglectful parenting, and her exposure to situations involving domestic violence.
